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MR. MCGUINESS: I have wasted a lot of time
talking to your organization over the last 11 years, and I

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1 wasn't going to come here today, because it doesn't seem like
2 anybody listens anyway. We will give it one more try. Talk
3 about all these questions. Every time I have come, I have
4 spoken at hearings in Oakland. I have spoke about low level
5 waste at Yucca Mountain -- I mean, at Ward Valley and
6 high-level waste here. And every time we do that and get
7 some answers to the questions that we are supposed to ask you
8 and they never make any damn sense. They don't ask any of
9 the questions. You put off some spin factory that put stuff
10 out. Are we going to get the real answers to this or is this
11 just another exercise in futility? That's all I ever see.
12 All you're doing, you spend a lot of money. You complain
13 about all the money, and you have hearings all over the
14 place. And nothing ever comes of it, other than you just try
15 to shove it down our throats.

16 When I first talked, you had Carl Gertz,
17 kind of a fun guy to talk to. He had great theories when I
18 asked him about the earthquakes. His attitude is when you
19 put the nuclear waste in water, it would go like a grape in
20 jello. It would just roll around, and nothing could possibly
21 harm. I thought that was a good plan.

22 Next time I talked to him it was about spent

1 fuel rods. Somebody asked him how -- explain what those
2 meant. He said they are like used flashlight batteries. A
3 lot of this stuff was going to be lethal for over 20,000
4 years. You are still putting out literature 10 now years
5 later. It makes no sense, and you want us to trust. I don't
6 want you to go back and take 10 now and make it 30 so you can
7 cover your butts. But think about what you're putting out.
8 You just read this stuff today.

9 I haven't been in this for awhile. I worked
10 as a bartender. I worked in a horse farm, taking some time
11 off. I'm still reading the same nonsense when I come back
2 12 into this. Yet you want us to trust. You're saying nothing
13 can possibly happen. We won't have any leaks. You know,
14 they said that there's no alternative. It's been saying that
15 for going on 10 or 11 years. All you are looking at is Yucca
16 Mountain. |

17 Everybody coming here, all the facilities
18 are just maxing out that you have no alternative, which means
19 that you can just go for national security and stuff it in
20 Yucca Mountain. Why don't you just come out and admit that,
21 because people are ready to block it. We have been out there
22 for years, been doing the test site for years. You have been

1 doing all the facilities for years. We're ready for it.
2 Just admit the fact you are going to try to ram it in there.
3 Because we know that.

4 Maybe you think the general public doesn't
5 understand, but most of us do understand that. You're
6 telling us you don't give a damn. What's going on? You're
7 just going to shove it on us, and we're not going to take it.

3 8 And that's just something I hope you understand. [The
9 transportation routes, truck or train, when you put our
10 initial stuff about the train you were going to go through
11 environmental sensitive areas, you're still planning that.
12 Are you going to go through?]

4 13 [When you talk about going through the route,
14 you got the spaghetti bowl in Las Vegas. People are afraid
15 to run that in a car. You want to run big trucks. You think
16 there's no problem. You're going to run Chicago, and it's
17 not a problem. Have you driven in these areas? I don't
18 think so. You think everybody is so safe. You are -- it's
19 not like you're driving through some little place in Kansas.
20 You say it's no problem with it. Transportation is fine.]
21 How come Nucwatch has your licenses taken when they follow
22 the trucks? Why is it when they are trying to make sure it's

1 fine, their licenses are taken away for five years because
2 they are trying to ensure for us what you're doing is safe.
3 Does that generate faith in us? I don't think so.

5 4 [They came out with the idea it was too cheap
5 to meter. That's because they never thought about
6 opposition. They never asked the general public what they
7 would think about having this stuff for thousands or -- and
8 thousands and thousands of years to take care of high-level 9
radioactive waste out there. But now you've got it. Now
10 you're worried about it going up. That's too bad. You
11 should have thought about that ahead of time. You are
12 chasing the almighty dollar. It's not our fault you are
13 spending too much damn money on something nobody really
14 wants. That's the idea you have to take into account.]

15 We don't want it. People with big money
16 want it. But they don't want it near their area. Dump it in
17 Beverly Hills, see how that goes over. There's a lot of
6... 18 money there. People make a lot of money. [Environmental
19 justice. Don't stick it in a place where black people live
20 and native Americans. Take it to wealthy, white people. If
21 it's just a good thing, they can use it. DOE doesn't want to
22 have anything dumped in their neighborhood. It is their

6 cont. 1 turn. The poor people don't want it.]

2 MR. LAWSON: 30 seconds please.

7 3 MR. MCGUINNESS: [You got all this nonsense
4 about money. Why are you worried about how much money you
5 are spending on this issue? You don't seem to care. You go
6 around spending money like drunken sailors until it comes to
7 a point now we're worried about health and children. And now
8 all of a sudden, it's a money issue. It doesn't make any
9 sense.] You got this depleted uranium project. Put in a
10 shell and dump it in Puerto Rico, shoot it in Iraq. We will
11 dump it in somebody else's yards in the name of war. We
12 either kill ourselves or kill somebody else. I stay stop
13 producing it. It's not up to us to help you find a place to
14 safely put it. It's up to us to stop you from producing it.

15 MR. LAWSON: Thank you. Last person I have
