

MS. DEVLIN: As you know, I kind of ran in here and got called upon. I just had three things I wasn't able to say, and again my name is Sally Devlin from Pahrump.

The first one was I mentioned Blake Ferris, and he's no longer there, it's Dr. Itkin, but the term was assumed uncertainty, and that was going to handle projects and problems that came up on the -- the context of the moment, and I said that blew my cork.

I don't know how you can handle 300 and 360 degree C waste on the context of the moment, and this is many -- one -- but one of the problems.

The other thing is I am so proud of Ruth. She dragged me to my first NWTRB meeting and I stayed, and I dragged her to a lot of other meetings, but anyway, she's the one that got me into this.

The first repository cost -- and it's in the summary of the EIS -- is 25 billion. The second repository is 35 billion. That's 60 billion dollars for the two repositories, and that is clearly stated.

1 The other thing that was barely mentioned in any of these is sabotage and terrorism, and this is really remiss on DOE's part.

The worst report I ever read was Carl Gertz's on intermodal travel, because that report not only doesn't give you the conditions of the highways, which is a 9 and a 7 for 95 and 160, but all the rest of them, and he doesn't mention sabotage and terrorism, and of course with these hundreds and hundreds of miles that the waste will travel, it is absolutely terrifying, and according to the State of Nevada, from their terrorism and sabotage report, if you could hold a 36 pound bazooka on your shoulder, you could bomb anything and they tell you how to do it. That's where I learned this from was from the State of Nevada.

There's only one other thing that I want to close with and this is a book from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and they give you the numbers of things that they regulate, and it's absolutely terrifying to me.

They regulate states and have agreements and all kinds of stuff, but they have approximately 15,000 sites that they regulate, and their staff is very ill informed, and if you look at their number of staff, and they had all cracker jack staff, they would visit each of these 15,000 sites once every two and a half years.

That is not reassuring and that is their book.

So this does include a little more information, but particularly sabotage, terrorism and all the rest of it, the two repositories. This is not mentioned. I mention it. Ruth, thank you for mentioning it. Now it's out to the public.
