

1 MR. STEVENS: This is sort of a personal observation that I have seen. One of the men that was up here was talking about the truck drivers. [When I was up in Beatty, Nevada, I was watching the so-called truck drivers, and I was really surprised, because if you go to Beatty, Nevada, you go past this little place that makes submarine sandwiches; right? So you watch these guys. I mean, they leave their trucks, they get out of their trucks, and the thing is they get back in their truck. And when they take off, it's unbelievable.

I was traveling towards Las Vegas on the way to the Nevada Test Site. I got into -- I got behind one of these haulers; right? And I said, this guy -- I mean, I was just seeing how fast he was going. I had to stop at 85 to 90 miles an hour; this is how fast this guy was flying. And the thing is -- well, you talk about if they get any tickets or anything. Well, my comment is, hey, these guys have got enough CB's and radios and stuff they know where all the smokies are at and stuff. If they see them, they are going to slow down. What really amazes me -- because I was sitting there saying I am hoping this person isn't a nuclear hauler -- and the thing that really amazed me, when I finally got down there, I looked at the Nevada Test Site and this guy was parked going in. So the thing is that this kind of stuff really spooks me.]

I talked to Robert Oppenheimer's brother one time, and I was dealing with -- well, Robert Oppenheimer was one of the makers of the bomb with Fermi. His brother told me that at one time -- he never would believe the thing would actually blow up. And it was like a one-second conversion from a bomb maker to an activist. He actually saw what potential was available.

It's like oh, like little kids playing, you finally find out what's going on. The other thing, too, is I see a lot of people here talking. If you go back in time to the Nuremberg trials, everybody was saying -- the Nuremberg trials was the trials for the Nazis after the war. The way a lot of these people are talking, it's like, yeah, you are talking exactly the way the Nazis did, trying to explain themselves at the death camps.

2 [The other thing I have to say is that a lot of people that are here, you are playing Russian roulette with our lives. The problem is you are not -- pointing the gun toward yourselves; you are pointing it at millions of people out there. And the thing is, just because the gun hasn't gone off yet, doesn't mean the gun isn't going to go off.

And one last comment. Most of my people were Pennsylvanian Dutch and Iroquois. The Pennsylvanian Dutch part was here 500 years, and almost 200 years before there was even a United States, quote-unquote. If both part of them, both my Iroquois and my Pennsylvania people, if you had asked them what this place was going to be like 400 years from now, it would not be a place we are sitting in right now. Their dreams were totally different. And what the white people have done is an atrocity to everybody that's on this planet.

And if you think -- I mean, if you figure we screwed it up in 200 years, and you expect this stuff to go away or aliens are going to come down and fix the problem, you guys are some sorry SOB's. Thank you.
