Dear Secretary of Energy Spencer Abrahams, please recommend to the President the following: I have lived, like most of us, in great physical comfort with too little regard to the energy I used. Because of my lavish use of electricity I intend to consider the crisis our country faces with 70 thousand tons of deadly radioactive waste, part of my responsibility. I see this problem as a monumental conflict that is so huge that none of us know how to deal with it: the comprehension of what 90,000 shipments for the next 30 years to a "permanent" depository represent in terms of risk and liability is beyond the human ability to comprehend. The knowledge, skill, or experience of so great a danger seems to be beyond human comprehension. A mistake was made when we developed nuclear power. Stop continuing to make the mistake, control the damage done the best we can, and make a new decision, one without disastrous consequences.

I understand that the problem dealing with the dangerous nuclear waste was passed from the nuclear power companies to the United States Government and the taxpayers. The government has started to invest a lot of money to prepare for storage of the deadly radioactive nuclear waste on sacred Native American land by moving and shipping it from 30 plants to one location. Did they assume that the Western Shoshone People's spiritual strength would match or neutralize the radiation resulting from the projected 268 accidents?

I propose the following: For the government to consult with Native American People for help as advisors about the best course of action to deal with the radioactive nuclear waste. Leave all other considerations aside, business interests, politics, power, and costs. At the present time, in our land, native people are best suited to manage the earth, the wisest, and most respectful, thoughtful, and familiar with the most democratic decision making process. They also are the most willing to talk honestly about the problem. The government by consulting with them, would validate the Tribes abilities, and maybe make up for the hardship they have put them through. As a citizen and taxpayer I would be willing to follow Native American advise. This might mean to pay for expansion and additional security of the present storage of nuclear waste near the power facilities until a naturalization can be invented. And all new production of nuclear power or arms needs to stop.
